Proposed Solar Farm in Rode - update

Rode Parish Council recently received the following update from Low Carbon, the company behind the proposed Solar Farm in Rode:

- Low Carbon is working with the various parties who made objections to the planning application (and/or required further information) - eg: Highways, Landscape Officer, Conservation Officer, etc;

- One definite change to the application will be to "pull away" from Flexham Farm [this is likely to mean that some of the proposed areas of panels in the immediate surrounds of Flexham Farm will be removed];

- This work may enable Low Carbon to provide relevant documentation to the Case Officer in time to have the application discussed at the March meeting of the Somerset Council East Planning Committee (which is 5th March)


- More likely, it will go to the April meeting (2nd April)

application as a result of this ongoing work.

Meanwhile, Somerset Council has been developing a Local Area Energy Plan. This will help identify areas across Somerset that are suitable for renewable energy generation such as solar and wind. It includes an assessment of all council assets and recommended projects to take forward and collaborate on. The council is is in the process of consulting internally on the final draft of the report and will be presenting it at the February meeting of the Wessex Community Energy Network. Community Orchard

I recently came across a great little article on the Somerset Community Food website....it's encouraging people to start a Community Orchard, and I wondered whether this was something of interest to any local residents or groups?

There are a number of great examples in Somerset (albeit in the west of the county):

Frieze Hill Community Orchard (Taunton): Set up in 2003 by a group of local people. The land used to form part of the adjacent allotments. The volunteer run group have planted over 100 trees, diverse hedges and organised lots of popular local events.

Porlock Vale Community Orchard (nr Minehead): Supported through the Get Growing Support Fund as part of the Somerset Land & Food Project. However their work started many months before, when two volunteers talked about how to revitalise the orchard in the village, communicating with the landowner and bringing people together to make the restoration possible.

Brendon Orchards, Wiveliscombe (nr Taunton): They hold community juicing sessions, run by volunteers where you can press small quantities of your own juice.

The "Tech Amnesty" in Frome Town Hall car park (sign-posted in the January Newsletter) was a great success....over 500 electrical items were donated, including 120 laptops and over 190 phones. The donations totalled 960kg of Smart Tech collected!

All this equipment is now with "Donate It" who will data wipe and where possible, refurbish and redistribute the tech to those who need it most. Anything that can't be reused will be disposed of responsibly.

Green New Year Resolutions

OK - so it's February! But you don't need to start every New Year's Resolution on 1st January. And if you're still looking for inspiration, here's a nice little list from the Somerset Community Action Group website:

Fix and Mend at Repair Cafés:

In 2024, make a commitment to sustainability by getting your broken items fixed at your local repair café (there's a quarterly Repair Café in Norton St Philip, and hopefully one in Rode soon - plus others nearby in Bradford, Frome, Trowbridge). Somerset's repair network provides a great resource: https://www.somerset.gov.uk/bins-recycling-and-waste/somersets-repair-network/ Embrace a culture of repair and reduce waste!

Combine Litter Picking with Wholesome Activities:

In 2024, why not commit to a weekly or monthly litter pick in your local area,

outdoors. [NB: if you're doing this on or near a road, it's a very good idea to litter pick as a couple or small group, wearing a hi-vis vest and keeping a constant watch for passing traffic.]

Keep Unwanted Items in Circulation:

De-clutter responsibly in 2024 by keeping unwanted items in circulation. Make a resolution to sell them on platforms like Vinted, Ebay, or Facebook Marketplace to make some money. Alternatively, consider donating to charity or participating in SwapShops for a sustainable approach.

Maximise Donation and Recycling Efforts:

Make a commitment to donating and recycling as much as possible in 2024. Explore options from kerbside recycling to dedicated recycling points. Ensure that items beyond repair find a responsible end (eg: see the Tech Amnesty paragraph above).

Embrace Secondhand First with the Traid Pledge:

Make a fashion statement in 2024 by committing to buy #SecondhandFirst. Take the Traid pledge and fill your wardrobe with unique pre-loved items. Learn more about clothes recycling here: https://www.traid.org.uk/

Volunteer with Local Community Groups:


