
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### **Welcome to the March Climate Emergency Group Newsletter**

### **Proposed Solar Farm in Rode - update**

As noted in the February newsletter, the planning application for a large-scale solar farm in Rode was due to be determined by 12th February. However, the applicant was required to provide a significant amount of additional information in order to respond to issues raised by consultees. Rode Parish Council has been informed that the determination date has therefore been extended and the application will probably be considered at the April meeting of the Somerset East Planning Committee (2nd April).

The application reference is 2023/2183/FUL].

The applicant has made some relatively minor changes to the proposed development (see list below), but unfortunately doesn't appear to have responded to the main concerns of local residents (which relate to the scale of the development, its proximity to the village of Rode, and its impact on

the Mendip Conservation Officer.

The proposed changes are as follows:

- 1. Removed some panels to the east and west of Flexham Farm house, and away from Frith Farm/Bradford Road.
- 2. Proposed some additional landscaping across the site, specifically:
- (a) reinstatement of two historic field boundaries in the north-west,
- (b) additional planting along boundary near Flexham Farm,
- (c) additional planting along boundary near no 8 Frome Road (a listed building),
- 3. Relocating an inverter away from Flexham Farm Listed Building.
- 4. Increasing 'no build' buffers across the site from boundary vegetation in areas of bat activity;
- 5. Increasing drainage near the Battery / Substation field.
- 6. Adding in additional space for turning into Rode Farm (Access 2, A361) and Vehicle parking / passing place within the Site.
- 7. Introducing a permissive Bridleway connecting Monkley Lane with Poplar Tree Lane.

As a result of the additional information, and the changes to the proposed development, Somerset Council has announced a re-consultation period, which runs until **14th March**.

If you wish to comment on any of these changes, and/or the updated information now available, on the Somerset Council website, make sure you are logged in (if you haven't previously logged in, simply register first). Then go to "Planning, buildings and land", select "View or comment on a planning application", choose "Mendip", then go to "Find an application". The application reference is 2023/2183/FUL. You should see an option to "make a comment" towards the top right of your screen.



#### Do you have an interesting home eco-project to share?

Over the past couple of years the Rode, Beckington & Norton St Philip Climate Emergency Group has held two "Green Open Home" events, with (on each occasion) around a dozen local homes hosting visits to their energy-saving projects. The technologies on display have ranged from solar PV and heat pumps to electric bikes and secondary glazing.

#### **Climate Emergency Group - Objectives for 2024**

The Rode, Beckington & Norton St Philip Climate Emergency Group met at the end of February and agreed the following key objectives for 2024 (most of which are continuations from last year's objectives, but no less important for that):

- a. **Support Local Bus Services:** It seems that the D2 services through Rode are again under threat, with the cost of running buses via Rode adding 6% to the overall cost, but raising only 2% more revenue. It is likely that the summer timetable will be largely unchanged, but there are risks that Rode (and perhaps other villages) will lose D2 services when the autumn/winter timetables come into force in September. It is therefore vital that we do what we can to help increase bus utilisation, in particular in Rode, over the coming months
- b. Work to deliver public EV charging points in Rode, Beckington & NSP: There are challenges to identifying a site in Rode, caused by the potential relocation of the Memorial Hall. Hopefully a plan will begin to emerge over the summer which will enable a permanent site in Rode to be identified. However, there are also potential sites in Beckington (eg: Whiterow Farm; village hall car park, and environs), and NSP (eg: Fleur de Lys car park).
- c. Continue to inspire change through community events: Plans for a

Shorts" event (similar to that run by Transition Bath)

- d. **Support the provision of safe walking/cycling routes:** The work on the LCWIP in Beckington has reached an impasse. We need to investigate what further can be achieved here for local connectivity.
- e. **Improve communication:** Much achieved in 2023....but still scope to improve (eg: more coverage in local parish magazines monthly articles published in Rode, but not in other local villages).
- f. **Commence work on a Community Energy Project:** There is definite potential for more local hydro projects, and we also agreed to investigate the potential for local households, businesses and schools, etc, to implement Solar PV [nb: check Beckington Primary School any lessons for other local schools? CW to investigate]

### Rewilding

Do you know a local land-owner, or someone interested in re-wilding? If so, they (or you) may be interested in an event being hosted by Heal Rewilding, a local organisation which raises money to buy land for rewilding. Their first site is at Witham Priory, just south of Frome.

And Heal has just announced its first ever rewilding gathering called "Into the Light" which is taking place on **Friday 10 May and Saturday 11 May** (at Witham Priory). Tickets are available online, with a limited number available at early bird rates with a 15% discount.

If you're interested in what's happening in rewilding, would like to spend time with others who love wildlife and want to help it thrive again, this is for you!

Into The Light runs over two days and you can book for one day or both days. There will be a big tent for talks and a smaller tent for book talks and other fringe activities.

On Friday, the focus is on rewilding finance and technology.

On Saturday, talks will be more general, on wildlife, rewilding projects and broader themes.

There's a fantastic programme each day, with a roster of brilliant speakers and plenty of time between talks for conversations. More information about the themes for each day and confirmed speakers is on the ticket page (link

We're hoping to run another "Green Open Homes" event locally in 2024, but in the meantime, you may be interested in a similar event in Wiltshire - with several properties being reasonably close (Bradford-on-Avon, Warminster, etc). As is customary, this Green Open Homes event - which runs from 9th - 17th March - is an opportunity to ask a local resident about an energy saving improvement that they've made, and see if it might work for you. Visiting a home is a great way to find out about the reality of getting solar panels, insulation, triple glazing, or new heating options, without talking to a salesman. You can have a good look at the technology, ask the residents whether the installation was a hassle, and find out much they're really saving on their energy bills as a result. 
Drawing on her experiences opposing nuclear weapons at Greenham Common airbase in the 1980s, and sharing her journey in movements like Extinction
