**\*\*SOMERSET PRESS RELEASES:** All Somerset County Council press releases: **Newsroom**

**\*\*SPORTSMAN:** Somerset Council is finalising the works order with the contractor and awaiting confirmation of when they can fit this work into their works programme. The contractor and Somerset Council Development Engineers will need to meet on site and discuss work methods and traffic management and hope that this can happen in the next few weeks.

**\*\*FLOOD ENGINEERING:** I have not heard back from James Divall, the officer who is taking over from Sean Papworth, about a briefing, and the works programme to get this completed. I will continue to chase this month.

**\*\*CHURCH FARM:** The Planning Obligations team have advised that the developer is in direct contact with the residents regarding the progress of the footpath. H has asked for my contact details so he can also keep me in the loop. I will keep chasing this along until fully resolved.

**\*\*BRADFORD ROAD / RODE HILL CROSSROADS:** Somerset Council is not looking at making any further improvements at this location. However, Sara Davis will look again this year hopefully to see whether she can make any improvements to reduce the bad driver behaviour.

**\*\*SLIP ROAD A36:** no update or response from National Highways. I will continue to chase.

**\*\*13/1 FOOTPATH DIVERSION:** I believe discussions are being had between the parish council, Andy Fussell and the Somerset Council Rights of Way team.

**\*\*HOUSING PRESSURES:** At the last Somerset Council meeting, a Conservative motion sought to highlight the county's growing housing pressures and called for Government recognition of the cumulative impact of issues such as nutrient neutrality delays, inward migration, rise in second homes, and increased demand from large infrastructure projects like Hinkley Point C. The motion proposed writing to the Secretary of State to outline Somerset's unique housing pressures and seek assurances that national schemes will not reduce housing provision for local people; requesting additional investment for housing; and affirming Somerset's commitment to prioritising Somerset residents for housing where legally and practically possible. The motion was debated at length but was ultimately defeated at the meeting.

**\*\*£101million BUDGET GAP:** Somerset Council must find £101million in savings for the next financial year to balance its budget. This target forms part of the updated Medium Term Financial Strategy and reflects the scale of the financial challenge facing the authority. A key part of the response is a council-wide transformation programme aimed at modernising services and reducing costs. The full business case for this programme is due to come to the Executive shortly and is expected to set out how savings will be achieved across different

workstreams. External auditors have stressed the need for urgent, detailed plans to avoid further instability.

**\*\*NEW FINANCE OFFICER:** Somerset Council has appointed its third Interim Chief Finance Officer (CFO) in under a year. The Council had originally planned to begin the recruitment process for a permanent CFO in October 2024, but the advert was not issued until January 2025—making it unlikely the role could be filled before the 2025/26 financial year. Having failed to appoint a suitable permanent CFO, a further interim has been appointed at a cost of £270,000 for nine months— £120,000 above the total annual budget allocated for the post. This additional cost is having to be met through the capitalisation directive.

**\*\*PAY & GRADING REVIEW:** Somerset Council will spend up to £3 million on external consultants to carry out a pay and grading review for staff, following the creation of the unitary authority in 2023. The review is intended to address inherited inconsistencies in pay structures and recruitment difficulties across certain roles. The process is expected to take nearly two years, concluding by April 2027, and may result in changes to staff pay levels.

**\*\*SAFE VAPE DISPOSAL:** Somerset Council and its waste contractor, SUEZ, are urging residents to dispose of used vapes separately due to rising safety concerns. Improper disposal—such as placing vapes in general waste or with other recyclables—can lead to fires when compacted in collection vehicles. To safely recycle both reusable and non-reusable vapes the council now asks residents to keep them separate by putting them into a small, clear tied bag, such as a sandwich bag, and leave it on top of one of the recycling boxes.

**\*\*SOMERSET ON SCREEN:** Somerset Council has reported that film and TV productions generated more than £4 million for the county's economy in the 2024/25 financial year. Much of this economic boost benefited local hospitality, accommodation, and catering businesses. [Screen Somerset](#), the Council's dedicated film office, supported a range of projects, including the upcoming adaptation of *The Salt Path*, filmed in locations such as Cheddar and Minehead. The Council is promoting screen tourism as a growing opportunity for Somerset, aiming to attract further productions and showcase the county's landscapes and communities on screen.
